One of the most popular programs the Ruth Lilly Health Education Center presents is Ready Set Grow which targets fourth grade students and their journey through puberty. Classes are separated by gender to allow the opportunity for student's questions more comfortably. The program's primary focus centers around heredity, hormones, and hygiene, along with a brief overview of the male and female reproductive systems.



Activities included in the program focus on traits inherited from their birth parents. Students build the face of a baby by flipping a coin between dominant and recessive traits. Their creation usually brings a chuckle to the class and can be extremely unique as they are.

Ready Set Grow also engages students with hygiene riddles, and discuss ways they need to care for their bodies as they go through puberty. The class concludes with a conversation about menstruation for the girls, along with more specific information relating to the boys.

The Ruth Lilly Health Education Center educators have taught 3,174 students at 44 schools for Ready Set Grow this year, with several more yet to go. This program reaches students in Crawfordsville, Noblesville, Pike, Carmel, Martinsville, Owen, Rush, and Delaware county schools, along with several private and parochial schools.
