One of the most popular and requested programs the Ruth Lilly Health Education Center presents is Life Begins, which targets fifth and sixth grade students and their changes through puberty. The program includes an overview of the male and female reproductive systems, fertilization, along with the stages of pregnancy. Also included in the program is a review of all body systems, and how their body grows and changes during puberty.

Activities included in the program include changes during puberty to both males and females, along with students utilizing response system technology to follow up questions from the Life Begins video.

Students' questions are always interesting, and our instructors are eagerly challenged with giving age appropriate responses.

Life Begins program concludes with the labor and delivery of baby “Fred” with students brainstorming ideas what the baby will need when he joins his family.

The Life Begins program reached 5780 students, 195 classes at 85 schools this year. The program engaged students in Marion, Hamilton, Brown, Montgomery, Dubois, Hancock, Henry, Ripley, Owen, Morgan, Johnson, Rush, Fayette, Shelby, Decatur, and Delaware county schools, along with several local private and parochial schools.
