Required Canvas Course: Faculty Supporting Student Success

In an effort to ensure Marian is supporting students during this difficult time, we administered a campus satisfaction survey twice during the semester. We had a 42% response rate in the most recent survey, capturing valuable data. As a result of the survey data, we developed a brief Canvas course for full-time faculty that should take no more than approximately 90 minutes to complete, which outlines best practices in supporting students. Important Change in Canvas This January



One of the most used tools in Canvas will be changing on January 1, 2021. The text entry tool, called the [Rich Content Editor](#), will be updated to [a new version](#) and the current one will no longer be available. This tool is used by instructors in content creation and by students in any text entry fields. This new version has more features but will look and act a little differently than what you may be used to. We encourage you to turn on the new version of the Editor in your course right now to try it out. In order to make sure everyone is ready for the transition, Blake Ide, Instructional Technologist of the CTL, has prepared a video to show you how to turn it on, and how to make sure that you can access all of the same tools (and a few new ones) in the new Editor.
