#### Attend the Mindfulness Series: Change Your Brain

Brain scans show mindfulness and meditation can actually change regions of the brain, including:

- Increased gray matter in the hippocampus, which deals with emotion and memory, and is damaged by chronic stress.
- · Decreased the volume of the amygdala, which is responsible for emotions such as stress, fear, and anxiety.
- Increased activity in the anterior cingulate cortex (ACC), which deals with self-regulation.

#### Do You Have Guests Attend Via WebEx? Read About These Changes...

WebEx has recently included options for enhanced security & privacy during meetings. Starting March 1st, all guest attendees (anyone with non-Marian email) will not be able to automatically enter a Webex meeting in progress, and will instead be placed in the meeting lobby. The host/co-host of the meeting will need to manually admit the guest users who are in the lobby. This change apply to both personal room meetings and scheduled meetings. This will not affect users with Marian accounts, and they will be able to continue entering meetings normally. When a guest attempts to join a meeting, the host will see a popup on the screen notifying them that someone is waiting in the lobby, and will see a button that they can click to let the guest(s) in. Also, the host can click the "Participants" button to view anyone who is in the lobby. #### Faculty Highlight: Anthony Marco at Ancilla College of Marian University

The CTL will highlight a faculty or staff member every month in an effort to honor the hard work of our Marian community. This month, we honor Anthony Marco, assistant professor of theology at Marian University's Ancilla College. He began teaching at Marian University in the fall of 2021.

CTL: What inspires your teaching and keeps your job meaningful?

Professor Marco: One of my goals is to engage our students in dialogue about the questions that theology raises. I am always inspired by how our students respond to this invitation and share their beliefs. Theology is not just a subject of study but a way of viewing the world through the eyes of faith – I find it immensely meaningful when students explore their world through this lens and allow me to come along for the ride.

CTL: What professional goals do you have in the next year?

Professor Marco: I am writing and my goal is to publish! This semester, I've been researching the Nicene Creed - the statement of belief that Catholics and many other Christians recite every Sunday. I am taking a

deep dive into what the words of the creed mean, how these words were interpreted when the they were written and how the creed invites each of us to enter into a profound relationship with God – a participation in the Divine nature (2 Peter 1:4).
