- Koru Mindfulness Series Brain scans show mindfulness and meditation can actually change the size of key regions of the brain, increasing resilience when under stress, improving memory, and increasing empathy and compassion. If you'd like to become more resilient with how you operate in your day-to-day life and grow an awareness of how your reactions and responsivity to situations impact you, check out the upcoming mindfulness series.
- Book Club The summer book is The Spark of Learning: Energizing the College Classroom with the Science of Emotion by Sarah Rose Cavanagh. Intentionally incorporating emotional impact into the curriculum captures students' attention, harnesses their working memory, bolsterers their long-term retention, and enhances their motivation.

## Now Available!! Level 2 Inclusive Certificate: Marian Pledge

Have you considered your personal role in helping Marian University to be a welcoming place for all who engage with our community? The Marian Pledge is an anti-bias curriculum designed by faculty and staff across campus; including Dr. Penny Asay and Dr. Michael Slavkin from Psychological Sciences and Counseling, Michelle Meer from Social Work, and Davyd Hall from the



Unity Center. The Marian Pledge team assembled an array of articles, materials, and program documentation that advances multiculturalism, as well as anti-bias training. Specifically, the Marian Pledge is designed to challenge any interested faculty, staff and students to explore on their own or in small learning communities materials that help to advance our understanding of living life as a diverse and responsible citizen in 21st Century America. The hope is to encourage each of us to be active in eradicating "isms" from our campus community and our world at large. We do this to respect individual as well as learn from diverse cultures, perspectives, and traditions. The Marian Pledge challenges the Marian community as we examine and celebrate what it means to be anti-racist and anti-biased. Not only does this material meet several areas of university needs, but also our individual needs in being better people and better able to welcome diverse voices and individuals to our community. This is a self-paced, 30-day Canvas course, which you may enroll into at any time. Self-enroll into the course here.

## Responsible Conduct of Research Course

We are pleased to announce the first offering of the Marian University Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR) Course! The RCR course (viewable at this <u>link</u>) consists of eleven modules on topics ranging from the broad role of research in society to the ethical considerations of human subjects to the practical aspects of data management. The course is intentionally designed to fulfill the National Institutes of Health requirement for RCR instruction and consists of both self-paced material (with quizzes) and face-to-face discussion sessions via WebEx dedicated to each topic. The content is appropriate for all members of the Marian University community involved in research, including faculty/staff and students from undergraduate and graduate programs. The course is directed by Drs. Jonathan Lowery (COM) and Patrick McVey (CAS) and will meet each Wednesday from 12-1 pm between May 26 and August 4. To receive a certificate of completion, the participant must successfully complete all 11 of the self-paced modules and participate at least 10 of the 11 discussion sessions. ## Your Colleagues Said It: Continued...

Mona Kheiry, Assistant Director for the CTL, asked a few faculty what teaching strategy they tried this past year, no matter how big or small, they felt was worthwhile to continue doing into the future. A few of you submitted answers to the survey, which include the following:

- Instructional Videos: I made instructional videos for the piano pieces my students were working on. These videos gave the
  students an opportunity to see and hear my lecture and playing tips again, if needed. I just finished making one for an
  assignment that I felt needed further explanation for their practice sessions over the weekend. Panopto is very user-friendly
  even for a non-tech person like me!
- Attendance Quizzes to Solicit Feedback: I used a Canvas quiz with access code as an efficient way to take attendance. Inspired by Stephen Brookfield's Critical Incident Questionnaire process (<a href="http://www.stephenbrookfield.com/critical-incident-questionnaire">http://www.stephenbrookfield.com/critical-incident-questionnaire</a>), I leveraged each quiz to solicit brief feedback from students on a specific aspect of their experience in the course. Because it counted attendance, I received a data set that was representative of the whole class. Because there were no right or wrong answers, I received honest, insightful, and very constructive feedback—students have some of the best ideas! Although I offered the option to decline to provide feedback and still log their attendance, almost all students chose to provide their perspectives. This has been a tremendously helpful way for me to make tweaks to format and provide supplemental content that could address students' needs throughout the semester, instead of waiting for end-of-course survey results.
