REGISTRATION INFORMATION

ACADEMIC ADVISING AND REGISTERING FOR CLASSES

CHANGES IN ACADEMIC PROGRAM AND/OR ADVISOR: If wishing to change advisors and/or declare or change a major, minor, or concentration, complete and submit the Change of Major/Advisor form available in the Office of the Registrar. Check your CAMS student portal as directed in your registration e-mail to see who is currently listed as your advisor in CAMS; submit a Change of Major/Advisor form well in advance of registration if the advisor listed is not correct. If the advisor listed in CAMS is not your correct advisor, you will be unable to register.

COURSE SELECTION & APPROVAL: Review course selections and complete a schedule planning form with your advisor.

- Self-tracking guides for general education graduation requirements are available at the Office of the Registrar to help in schedule planning.
- If you are registering for a course for which you do not have the required prerequisite, a course that requires instructor permission to register, or courses with conflicting class meeting times, you must obtain signatures from the applicable instructor(s) on your schedule planning form and bring the form to the Office of the Registrar after you have registered online so these courses can be added.
- If registering for an independent study or tutorial, obtain a request for private study form from the Office of the Registrar (MH 104). These courses require the approval of Bill Harting, Assistant Provost.

REGISTRATION: Registration for continuing students will take place online. **All students receive information about determining their appointed registration day by e-mail at their Marian University e-mail address;** registration days are assigned based on class level as determined by the number of earned credit hours. Registration will take place October 29-November 9. **For assistance with online registration, please see the information provided on our [Registration Resources](#) page.**

- Newly admitted and readmitted students will receive information regarding when and how they can register.
- **NO LATE REGISTRATION:** Students **must** register by Sunday, Jan. 13th @ 11:59pm or they will not be able to start classes for the spring semester. The CAMS Student Portal will be available for online registration through 11:59pm on January 13th.
- **SCHEDULES & TEXTBOOKS:** Following registration, print a copy of your schedule from your CAMS student portal. You must have a schedule in order to charge textbooks to your Marian University student account. Required textbooks can be viewed online at www.marian.edu → Current Students → My Marian → Bookstore.

You must comply with the published tuition payment policy and meet all tuition payment deadlines in order to confirm your registration. Students who do not comply with the published tuition payment policy will incur late fees on their student accounts.

WAITING LIST

- If placed on a waiting list, you are not considered to be registered for that course unless an opening becomes available.
- Nursing students are not permitted to place themselves on waiting lists for clinicals.
- Check your schedule via your CAMS student portal to see whether you have been taken off the waiting list and added into the class. Other notification of waiting list status will not be provided.
- The Friday before classes begin, all waiting lists will be finalized and students will no longer have the ability to add themselves to a waiting list or to be moved from the waiting list into the class. It will no longer be possible to get into a course from the waiting list without following the schedule change procedure as described below. If you are not comfortable taking the risk that you may not get into a closed class at the last minute, select an alternate course to complete your schedule.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

- At any time before Sunday, January 13th at 11:59 p.m., you may drop or add classes online through your CAMS student portal. On or after the first day of the semester, you must submit any changes to your schedule, including section changes, in person at the Office of the Registrar using a Schedule Change (Drop/Add) form. Instructor and advisor signatures are required beginning January 14th. You are responsible for adhering to the following deadlines to add and/or drop courses.
- **LAST DAY TO ADD A CLASS; LAST DAY TO DROP A CLASS WITHOUT “W” GRADE & \$50 FEEJAN. 18**
- **LAST DAY TO WITHDRAW FROM A SINGLE CLASS (for semester-long courses).....MARCH 29**
- **LAST DAY TO WITHDRAW FROM ALL CLASSES FOR THE SEMESTER (WITHDRAW FROM THE UNIVERSITY).....APRIL 26**
- A \$50.00 fee will be charged for *each* Schedule Change (Drop/Add) form submitted on or after January 21nd.
- **If you discontinue a class without following the above procedure to drop the class, you will receive a failing grade.**

PLEASE NOTE: Students are expected to pay all student account charges by the due dates published by Marian University. The student will be responsible for paying any and all costs associated with collection efforts by Marian University. This may include interest, collection costs, attorney fees and court fees.

SCHEDULES FOR WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY and REDUCTION OF CHARGES:

A student who withdraws from school may be entitled to full or partial reduction of charges. Reduction of charges is based on the official date of withdrawal as recorded in the Office of the Registrar. Consult with the Financial Aid Office concerning the impact that withdrawal may have upon current financial aid awards.

Standard (semester-long) courses

- withdraw during calendar week 1 = 100%
- withdraw during calendar week 2 = 90%
- withdraw during calendar week 3 = 60%
- withdraw during calendar week 4 = 25%
- withdraw during calendar week 5 or after = 0%

Courses lasting 5 weeks or more

(up to, but not including, semester-long courses)

- withdraw during calendar week 1 = 100%
- withdraw during calendar week 2 = 50%
- withdraw during calendar week 3 or after = 0%
- *last date to withdraw with “W” grade – 5 business days before the end date of class*

Courses lasting 4 or fewer weeks – no “W” grades given without complete withdrawal from the university

- withdraw prior to start of class = 100%; withdraw after class begins = 0% – *last date to withdraw with “W” grade – 5 business days before published end date of the class. If class meets less than 5 days, withdraw is not permitted after class begins.*

FILE FOR GRADUATION

- 2018-2019 Associate and Bachelor degree candidates must file a Graduation Application with the Office of the Registrar no later than December 1, 2018. Click on the *graduation application* link at www.marian.edu/commencement.

CLASS CANCELLATION OR CHANGE

- The university reserves the right to change or cancel courses as needs and enrollment warrant. Because course information may change in between registration and the first day of classes, students should print an updated schedule from their CAMS student portal immediately prior to the start of the classes.

COURSE LOAD

- The normal load for a full-time student is 12-18 credit hours per semester.
- Because academic performance may suffer when an overload is taken, students with a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or above wishing to enroll in 19 or more credits and students with a cumulative GPA below 2.0 wishing to enroll in 17 or more credits must receive signature approval from the Office of Academic Affairs, MH 110.
- An additional per credit hour fee is charged if enrolled in more than 19 credits per semester.
- Full-time students earning fewer than 16 credits each semester will be unable to complete degree requirements in the prescribed four years for a bachelor degree or two years for an associate degree, unless additional credits are earned during summer school or by examination.

ATTENDANCE AND CROSS-REGISTRATION

- See information and policies as printed in the [Undergraduate Course Catalog](#). Information for those interested in the cross-registration program (the Consortium for Urban Education – CUE) is available by request in the Office of the Registrar. All cross-registration forms for spring 2019 classes must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by December 1, 2018.

CONVOCATIONS

- Convocations are a required component of each department’s senior seminar course. All Marian University students are encouraged and welcome to attend the convocations.

PASS/FAIL AND AUDIT OPTIONS

- **PASS/FAIL OPTION** - This option is available to juniors and seniors in elective courses (not applicable to courses required for the major or minor discipline, certification, or general education). Using the Schedule Change (Drop/Add) Form, all changes to or from pass/fail status must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by February 15.
- **AUDIT GRADING OPTION** – Students wishing to audit a course must be admitted to the university. This option is not available for laboratory, studio, or practicum courses. No credit or grade is given. A fee of \$200.00 per credit hour is charged for an audited course. All changes to or from audit status must be recorded on a Schedule Change (Drop/Add) form and submitted to the Office of the Registrar by January 18.

COURSE LEVELS

- Courses numbered below 100 level (ENG 099, COL 099, MAT 090, MAT 095) are graded developmental courses designed to bring students up to the college level in these subjects. A combined maximum of 12 credits in developmental, activity, and enhancement courses may apply toward a bachelor degree or 6 credits toward an associate degree.
- Numbers 100-299 are lower division courses designed primarily for students at the freshman and sophomore levels.
- Numbers 300-498 are upper division courses primarily for juniors and seniors but are open to students who have completed the freshman level of study.
- Number 499 designates independent study or a research project at an advanced level.
- Numbers 500+ are graduate level courses.
- Of the 128 credits for a bachelor degree, at least 64 credits must be at the 200 level or above.

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT OF 1974 (FERPA)

Marian University operates in compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), as amended. Students have the right to inspect all official records which pertain to them and to challenge inaccurate or misleading information, except parents' financial records and confidential letters and statements placed in the record before January 1, 1975, or placed under conditions where students have signed a waiver of right of access.

All student academic information is considered confidential except the following "directory" information available to the public: student's name, campus address, off-campus address, email address, telephone number, date of birth, photograph, major field of study, participation in university activities and sports, physical and performance statistics of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, enrollment status, degrees, awards, and honors including the Dean's List, and most recent previous institution attended by student.

The student may request that "directory" information not be released by completing the FERPA Request form in the Office of the Registrar at the beginning of each semester. Failure to notify the Office of the Registrar may mean that university publications, such as team rosters or student directories, may include some directory information. ARMY RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING (ROTC)

Through a cooperative program with IUPUI, Marian University students may enroll in the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) program which leads to a commission in the U.S. Army, Army National Guard or Army Reserve. All ROTC classes (indicated with course prefix MIL) taken are applied as general electives to your Marian University academic record. The leadership classes are open to full-time students, men and women, without incurring any obligation to continue the program to enter into military service. The first two years are exploratory in nature and offer one or two hours of academic credit per semester. Students wanting to continue the program and receive a commission upon graduation must apply for admission into the advanced program at the end of the second year of ROTC. Selection is competitive. Marian University students who are eligible for assistance can receive significant scholarship assistance by participation in this program. There are no restrictions on majors for students interested in ROTC. Students who do not continue may still use credits as electives earned toward any degree. SPECIAL TOPICS COURSES

COM 280 A: Student Media (2 credits)

In this course, students create and manage content for *MU Knightwatch*, the co-curricular student newspaper and digital media outlet.

CST 280 A: Design and Analysis of Algorithms (3 credits)

Prerequisites for this course include CST 200 and MAT 230. This course will cover advanced topics in data structures and algorithms beyond those studied in CST 200. Central to the course will be an understanding of the asymptotic worst-case performance of algorithms also known as big-O. Students will gain hands-on experience developing algorithms with performance trade-offs in mind, and learn to combine and compose multiple data structures to solve increasingly difficult problems. Topics in graph theory, optimization, dynamic programming, and NP-completeness will be addressed.

EDU 280 A: International Comparison of School and Society with Study Aboard (3 credits)

ENG 180 A: Literary Perspective (3 credits)

Prerequisite: ENG 112. Literary Perspectives is designed for those drawn to literature as a way to understand the world, to imagine responses to current events, and to understand the diversity of human experience. Students will read, analyze, and write about literary texts in ways that connect them to the larger world and, in the process, become acquainted with critical and creative habits, opportunities, and values in the disciplines of Literature and Writing. ENG 180 counts toward the major and is open to all students.

ESS 380 A: Sport Physiology with Lab (4 credits)

Prerequisites: ESS 120 and ESS 265 or BIO 225, or permission from the instructor. This course is a survey of Sport Physiology as it relates to fitness, performance and health. Topics include neuromuscular, metabolic, cardiovascular, pulmonary, and muscular responses to exercise, the methods for improving exercise performance and special considerations that are specific to the science of sport physiology. Coursework will focus on application of knowledge into practical skills designed to improve performance and health enhancement. A laboratory experience will be part of this class.

HIS 380 A / GST 380 A / SOC 380 A: Global Women's Movements (3 credits)

This course will examine the history of women's movements around the world. We will focus on several thematic issues such as women's rights as human rights, violence against women, and grass roots activism. By studying both primary and secondary sources, students will analyze local and global conflicts surrounding gender-based inequalities. Using various case studies from around the world, we will examine the ways in which gender, nationality, culture, religion, and other differences have impacted women's lives. We will analyze the varied ways in which power and social control both create and complicate the process of political activism. This course will expand your awareness of social justice movements throughout history, especially those led by women, and their links to contemporary resistance to gender oppression.

HIS 380 B: History of the US Presidency (3 credits)

No prerequisite. This course examines one of the most powerful elected offices in American democracy and global political history. From the office's creation in the 1780s to today, this governmental position has been a major factor in contemporary issues, and is also a way for historians to organize and periodize the past by examining how different administrations approached various social, economic, and political issues. As such this course will not simply examine the biographies of the office holders, but also study the issues, crises, and historical impact that has shaped this political office, and how that office in turn has shaped world history.

HIS 380 C: Indiana History (3 credits)

This course is a survey of the social, political, and economic history of the state of Indiana. It encompasses the history of the area pre-statehood and begins with an examination of Native American and Indigenous history and proceeds chronologically to the present day. It also examines the specific military conflicts, political issues, and economic concerns modern state and city governments have in general, and the specific history of Indiana.

HON 380 A: The Years of Peace (3 credits)

THE 380 A / COM 380 A: Film Production (3 credits)

This half lecture/half lab course will first give students an understanding of the principles of film theory before immersing them in film scripting and production. In the first half of the course, students will explore film history, theory and genre and how those concepts influence film production. Students will then direct a narrative or non-narrative short film, work as crew members on a second film and critique the finished products. Students will learn the basics of cinematography, editing, sound and production design while gaining an understanding of the ins and outs of filmmaking from inception to completion.
